Key Vocabulary

Continent – a large area of land usually made up of several countries.

Ocean – a large area of water covered parts of the planet.

Country – an area of a continent or island controlled by a government.

City – a large part of a country where people live and work.

Town – a small area of land where people live and fewer places to work.

Village – a smaller area of land where people live.

Population – how many people live in a given area.

Physical features – what the land looks like naturally, rivers, lakes, seas, mountains, waterfalls, hills.

Human features – what people have added to the land like roads, buildings, airports, factories.

Map – a drawing that details key information about an area of land.

How would we travel to Kenya?

Most people would travel to Kenya, in Africa, by plane. They would need to have a passport, go through an airport to depart and check into a country, when they arrive, using their passport. Our stunning start will give us the chance to explore this process.

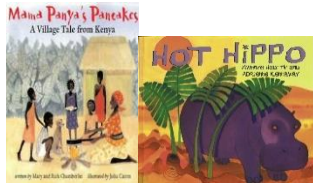

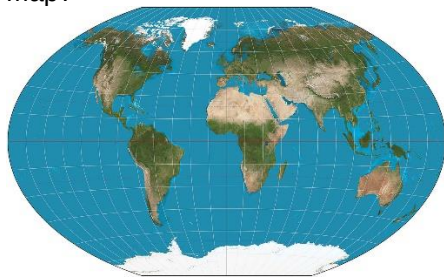


Did you know...
